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## **Summary of events for 2022**

Despite a huge number of puppies coming through in the early part of the year, the boom that started in 2021 inevitably slowed, and we went back down to more reasonable levels for the rest of the year. We trained enough puppies this year to give us a grand total of over 100,000 in the past 20 years that PS has been in existence - a huge acheivement for us all.

The start of this year brought changes in our admin team. Rachel Welch, who has been such a big part of PS for 6 years decided to move to the larger pond of Dogs Trust. While wishing her well, we quickly found a great person to do the Operations side of the work, our PS tutor from the West Midlands, Sarah Smith. Rather than find someone to take on the special projects part of Rachel's role, I decided to split this part off and give it to people within Puppy School who have special areas of expertise. We now have Adam Smith giving his marketing expertise, Jenny White covering social media, longterm experienced tutors, Eleanor McCall and Chrissie Pargeter, who have brought their amazing professional and life experience to become our new Regional Manager Team Leaders, and I'm sure there will be many others in future. This approach spreads the work and makes great use of the huge wealth of knowledge and expertise within the PS family.

Gail Hutchman, who has been keeping our accounts and orders in check for the past 12 years also made a break for freedom and a new job in Autumn this year. She will be greatly missed by all and her replacement,



Kelly Nicholson, will take over as the year ends as Accounts Manager.

The last of our series of six Behaviour Courses was taught in March by our talented PS tutor, APBC member and Regional Manager, Nicole Harris. Nicole has kindly agreed to run these courses again for us for the next 3 years and so the series started again in Autumn with Behaviour 1. The March course was run in-person in Gloucestershire, but with the perennial difficulties of getting time off work for attendees as well as child and dog care, it was agreed that we would trial running the Autumn course online instead. So it became a series of webinars available for 2 months, with a live and lively zoom meeting for case studies and Q&As at the end. This seemed to work well and made the information more accessible to more people, but we missed the face-to-face interaction that comes when the PS family meet up.


In June, we held our biggest and best-so-far PS Conference (see page 10), the first for 4 years due to the pandemic, but it was all the more enjoyable after the absence and lovely to see everyone again after so long. We were

also able to celebrate the Puppy School's 20th year of being founded. Our first classes started 20 years ago in February next year so more celebrations to be had then.

Tutor training courses were held in Spring and Autumn for our newest recruits. Our new format of a combination of live courses and online lessons is working well, but we are constantly updating and improving what we do and have some exciting improvements to implement next year

Something big and new that will really help our tutors run their businesses was a brand new intranet and map which we introduced in the latter part of the year. See page 16 for more.

In November we held a coaching weekend for those wanting to take their assessment with the Association of Pet Dog Trainers to brush up their teaching skills and help them pass. This has been very successful in the past with many previous attendees passing the rigorous assessment.





All in all, it was a busy and productive year with some good changes being made that will set us up nicely for more success in the future.

## **Key Puppy School Statistics**

#### **Tutor Numbers**

At the end of 2022, Puppy School now comprises of 92 full tutors and 44 associate tutors teaching Puppy School, Older Puppy School, Puppy University and SuperPup courses. We have 10 resting tutors/associates (those not currently active, either on maternity leave or taking a break). We have 9 provisional tutors and 8 provisional associates currently working on their correspondence course and already, we have several keen new applicants waiting to undertake their tutor training course in 2023.

#### **New Tutors and Associates**

We had new 3 tutors and 7 new associate tutors train with us during 2022 with a further 6 tutors already waiting to join us for training in Spring 2023! Congratulations to those who managed to complete their correspondence course this year and best of luck to those who are in progress of completing their training.

### **Puppy Numbers**

Despite the knock-on affect of the pandemic and the problems in the economy brought on by world events, the number of puppies going through our Puppy School classes in 2022 has been surprisingly high overall.

With an estimated 8,046 puppies completing our classes this year. This brings the total number of puppies which have passed through the hands of Puppy School tutors to 100,264 during the 20 years we have been running. Over 100,000 pups is an amazing number and we are all really proud to be part of that incredible achievement.

# 2022 Highlights from Puppy School

### Launch of face-to-face SuperPup classes

SuperPup was originally developed as an online course during the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns as a fun way for owners to practice exercises they learnt during online puppy classes. It was such a success, that as the restrictions ended, we realised it could work well, with a few adjustments, as an in-person face-to-face course.

So, in February of this year, we launched the live version. This six-week tutor-led course consists of fun exercises and challenges that help solidify and advance the training tutors started with their owners in Puppy School classes. The marketing angle that focuses around puppies gaining superpowers really interests and attracts clients and, wrapped up in its attractive SuperPup 'skin', we have been able to disguise a core of serious training exercises and skill development.

For most owners, it comes at a time when their puppy is just starting to go through adolescence, and the exciting nature of the exercises helps keep pups and owners

connected and deepens their relationship. The 'Mission of the week' challenges, where owners are encouraged to try something new each week, helps to continue

socialisation and gives them a much better connection. All-in-all, this is a great course for tutors to run, and for owners and pups to attend. Tutors can watch their clientele continue to grow and develop as they head into adolescence, and owners can take their maturing puppy's boundless energy and develop it into superskills for life.

Chrissie's background is in Human Resources, working predominantly for the NHS over the last 20 years in roles that vary from coaching and mediation to her current role as Human



### Puppy School Tutor Training Courses 2022

In 2021, we trialled a new approach for our



tutor training. We took out much of the intense lesson learning from the face-to-face workshops and put it online instead as evening webinars, giving students a lot more time to mull over and learn. This was so successful that we have stayed with it and this is how we ran things in 2022. The first of our 'live' sessions for new tutors in an Introductory weekend, run by Gwen Bailey and Catherine Tomlinson. Trainees are taught and coached on all sorts of useful topics throughout the weekend, such as how to teach a skill, public speaking, effective

The practical handling course is hosted by Claire Luscombe, Gwen and Sarah Smith with Puppy School clients and puppies being invited to come back for tutors to work with. This is a great way for new tutors and associates to learn to coach for real, practice their skills, and experience the real-life scenarios and client questions they will experience when they start their own classes.

From Vicky Clifton, Spring 2022 Tutor Training Course: ""I fell in love with dog training after putting my first dog, Digby, though Puppy School and Puppy University back in 2015/16. Having never owned or trained a dog of my own before, I didn't



know what to expect going into classes; but I loved the supportive, friendly and rewardbased environment that Puppy School provided. I eagerly signed us to up to every other type of training class my tutor provided through her own business as well as trying out anything else that came our way. Safe to say I was addicted and it became my new favourite hobby! When I got a new puppy in 2020, I was quick to sign up to PS classes again and we also did SuperPup and Puppy University. This led to my tutor asking if I would be interested in joining her as an associate tutor. I leapt at the chance of turning my hobby into a job and for the opportunity to provide owners with the skills needed to help their puppies get the best start in life.



I started my tutor training course in February. It was good to have the first part face-to-face so we could meet each other and get the foundations for the rest of the course in place. Going forwards from there though; the online lectures were perfect for me to be able to fit in around the varied shifts of my day job, especially being a mixture of 'lives' and recordings. I really enjoyed broadening my knowledge of training, behaviour and learning how to successfully be a good tutor. When it came to the practical training in April, it was good to have the opportunity to work with a wide range of puppies and put all the theory into practice. We were all very nervous when it came to leading a class, but we were all buzzing afterwards and it was great to have the chance to practice in a controlled way. I qualified in August and am looking forward to the future and all the lovely puppies I get to meet and train!"

## Success of Behaviour Course 6

After what seemed like a very long absence due to the pandemic, Nicole Harris and Claire Luscombe ran PS Behaviour Course 6 as a face-to-face course at Guiting Power, Gloucestershire in March 2022. Behaviour 6 - 'Doggy Dilemmas' covered topics such as fear/anxiety around other dogs and frustration around other dogs. This course was the last in the series of six written by our PS tutor, Regional Manager and behaviour expert Nicole Harris, and what a great series it has been. As with all of our face-to-face behaviour courses, we headed for a short walk in the beautiful Cotswold countryside after our sessions, and then back to the local pub for a nice group meal. How lovely to see so many faces again.



## **Puppy School Conference 2022!**

Our most recent Puppy School Conference was due to take place back in 2020 but was pushed back two whole years due to the pandemic. We almost held it in 2021, but the thought of all of us having to wear masks, be socially distanced and not eat together was too much and so it was postponed again. Fortunately, most of our speakers were understanding and simply held on to our booking until this year when we were free to run without restriction.

This year's conference was held in the beautiful surroundings of the Forest of Dean back in sunny June 2022 and it was our most successful conference to date. Seventy-seven tutors and associates attended with 25 partners, 4 children and 61 dogs! Many of our



tutors stayed in the self-catering cottages, dormitories or camped on site at the venue and it was fantastic to have us all in one place to catch-up.

This year we were joined by Tug-E-Nuff whose representative was on hand for tutors to take a look at their new range of demo toys and sign up for their exclusive Puppy School trade discount, as well as a speaker from Adaptil, a pheromone product so useful for settling puppies into their new homes. As with previous years, our conference was generously sponsored by Natures Menu, and we are very grateful to them for allowing us to have a bigger and better conference than we otherwise would.

The mornings of our conference consisted of some superb practical sessions where our dogs could stretch their legs and use their brains. These are run by Puppy School tutors who have particular interests in other areas of dog training as well as some excellent external trainers. We ran these active sessions in the mornings so that dogs are happy to rest in the afternoons while we listened to speakers.

Huge thanks to Sandie and Bill Dallow who ran an introduction to 'Sandie's Scent School'. Sandie's session introduced us to some of the fundamental skills essential to Scentwork. Sandie is a retired police dog handler with a wealth of experience and so many stories of a retired police dog handler with a wealth of experience and so many stories of the 'jobs' she attended, which helped make the session really interesting and 'real'.





Claire Luscombe hosted a wonderful 'Puppy Parkour' session in which dogs and owners worked on ways to conquer obstacles, such as climbing, balancing, and careful jumping. So much fun was had with our dogs in the sunshine that afternoon.

Karen Boyce and her team hosted an excellent introduction to 'Hoopers' – agility without jumps! This was a nice introduction to Hoopers which is currently sweeping the doggy nation thanks to its accessibility for all dogs whilst maintaining the same pace and excitement as taking part in agility training. Using ground-level hoops, barrels and tunnels, Karen and her team taught us and our dogs how to learn the basics of this fun new sport.









The fabulous Helen Phillips from *Clicker Gundog* got us all up working in practical groups and showed us some lovely, kind techniques to help with some of the challenges of managing active, working dogs. Watching Helen's kind and considerate approach to training in action with her own young Vizsla, Dibble, was wonderful and we all had great fun putting Helen's training games into practice.



Cushla Lamen, a former Puppy School Tutor gave a thought-proving talk about Galen Myotherapy, a highly specialised manual therapy and exercise management tool, which uses appropriate and targeted massage techniques and exercise management to manage chronic muscular pain. We paired off into groups and had a great interactive session in which Cushla showed us all how to use this powerful therapy technique to benefit our four-legged best friends.



We are sure we can speak for all our tutors when we say that all our workshops were very well received and everyone had such fun team building with their dogs!



Our speakers and lecturers this year included Mike Simmons from World of Wings who ran a lovely seminar on 'Transition from Tradition' which was all about moving training forward and leaving the less ethical methods behind. Mike's guests included an array of beautiful birds including the dearest little Burrowing Owl who, once out, didn't want to go back into his travel box!

What a fantastic talk which inspired us all to continue to search for the best practice in animal training and to continue to remember why we all set out on our positive training journey in the first place.





Jackie Newcombe who has worked with Dramatic Societies in the past, hosted a fun lecture focusing on presentation skills and voice projection which is useful for our tutors when they teach their classes. Jacki gave some great hints and tips on voice projection and clarity with practice sessions that were hugely entertaining as well as useful.

Charlotte Carr, Companion Animal Behaviour Technical Manager for CEVA Animal Health told us all about their new ADAPTIL Junior



collar range and the ADAPTIL Puppy Journals written by Gwen and now available to veterinary practices around the UK. As well as being full of useful information for puppy owners, each Journal carries the Puppy School logo and is a great advert for our classes.

Melanie Sainsbury, Veterinary Education Manager from Natures Menu also hosted a talk for us. Tutors were invited to send in questions they wanted answers to, or tricky questions they had been asked by owners, and Mel built her talk around her very useful answers. During this lecture, Mel gave us





an overview on how to approach frequently asked questions such 'Why do my client's vets always say no to raw diets?', how to deal with media scares and what to do if raw is not a practical choice.

Our very own Gwen Bailey, Claire Luscombe and Louise Otter gave a wonderful talk entitled 'Cat meets Dog, Dog meets Cat'. Claire and Louise have both fostered many cats and kittens through their rescue



work, and Gwen, as well as specialising in introducing rescue dogs to homes with pets for many years, has recently introduced a kitten and rescue dog into her busy household so they have plenty of experience to draw on. During this lecture, they gave us some top tips for peaceful and successful introductions for these two species so that existing pets happily learn to live with new arrivals and no one wants to leave home!

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


### New Puppy School Intranet

Puppy School has a massive library of information that is available for the PS family to use. It covers everything needed to run PS classes, from information about the PS syllabus and lesson plans, to marketing, how to sell goods in class, to the more mundane forms and documents. 


### **New Puppy School Map**

When Puppy School first started, it relied on paper maps of postcodes to plan its franchise territories. This was cumbersome and time-consuming, especially when a territory fell on the overlap between two maps. Over time, online postcode maps took over and eventually we settled on Adobe Illustrator to create a map on which we could log all tutor territories and Regional Manager areas. Using the map was difficult and a .pdf of the whole UK would was so large that it was difficult to transfer and would take a long time to open, causing some computers to crash in the process.

So we've been looking for another solution for a long time, and, recently, Alice Crick's partner, Luke, realised he had the skills and software to create our very own special map.

So we now have a brand new Puppy School virtual map. This detailed map allows the viewer to quickly and easily see all tutor's territories across the UK, all RM regions, as well as being able to scroll in to see the minutest of details on the map (roads, houses etc) for easy planning. Eventually, we plan to add pin drops for each venue to show where





each Puppy School class is being hosted from across the country. This map will be available for all Puppy School Tutors and associates to access via the intranet. Thanks to Alice and her partner Luke for setting this up for us.

Firstly, what does your dog find rewarding? Treats are the easiest way to reward your dog for trick training due to the repetition needed. Use treats that are broken up small, Natures Menu meaty treats are good to use for this. Start in a place where your dog is motivated for the treats and not too distracted by other things, at home is probably perfect. Toys can also be used as a reward but you will need to make sure that you give time for your dog to play with them. Toys can be used to advance the trick, as mentioned later.

## **Puppy School Plans for 2023**

2023 will be Puppy School's 20th year of running classes, starting with Delia Graham's classes in February 2003. We hope to celebrate our success next year and use the anniversary to publicise the work we do as widely as possible.

Next year we will be making slight improvements to the way we teach our new trainees. Our method is already good but we think we can do better with a few tweaks to how we coach our trainees to master all the techniques and skills they need. With the prevalence of phone apps, such as WhatApp, sharing of videos is so much easier now, and so trainees will soon be required to submit videos of their training so their Regional Managers can coach and fine tune them on their journey.

This year, a group of us have been working hard, with Regional Managers, to produce a syllabus change to replace puppy play in class with puppy greetings. It may seem like a subtle change but we think it will have a massive impact on what we teach new owners and how they manage their puppy's interactions with others. More about this next year.

Another big project is the new website design. We have found a good designer and are working hard to produce a new site that is functional and attractive, and works harder than our current one that has served us well for the past 20 years. An exciting new addition will be the facility to have an online educational resource, at first for our PS clients, and later, perhaps, for puppy owners everywhere.

Next year we also hope to start providing additional courses for PS tutors following on from the success of SuperPup. These additional courses will be fully formed and well designed, and we plan to begin with a 'Happy Handling' course, written by Louise Otter, that will help our puppy owners learn how to do puppy-led free-choice handling. We hope this will be just the start of a stable of interesting and useful further classes to offer to owners.

And finally, we are hoping to change the old APDT assessment course to include other organisations and also to offer it as coaching practice to anyone wishing to improve their abilities to help owners be successful.

So another exciting and busy year ahead of us in 2023.
