Twenty Years of Puppy School

Over 100,000 puppies

Puppy School celebrated 20 years of puppy training this year! During that time, over 100,000 puppies and their owners have all being on the receiving end of beautifully positive training advice and coaching which, we hope, one day, will create the new norm for how puppies everywhere are trained.

- Delia Graham ran the first official class in Peggs Green, Leicestershire 20 years ago in February 2003
- June 2003, Celia Callan, Warminster and Salisbury, Wiltshire, celebrated 20 years as a Puppy School tutor
- July 2003, Margaret Turner, Cornwall, and briefly in Ireland, celebrated 20 years as a Puppy School tutor
- October 2023, Claire Luscombe, Torquay, Devon, celebrated 20 years of amazing classes

I'm beyond proud of the quality of incredible puppy tutors in our Puppy School family, some of whom have been with us for such a long time, but also of those newer to Puppy School who continue to join our ranks. Between us, we are an amazing resource of behaviour and training knowledge and experience, and we are poised to make more use of this than ever in the years to come.

Brand new website

One of our major achievements this year has been the development of a brand new website for Puppy School. The old one was created on a shoestring and did us proud for the past 20 years but we were well overdue for a change and to present a more professional image that reflects the excellent work we all do. With a great design, professional photographs and links that allow bookings direct from the website, the new site that went live on 1st December provides a shining showcase of our wonderful classes, our ethos, and what we are all about.

Improved training programme

We trialled a new video coaching approach to training our new tutors this year. Our trainees submitted video logs of training techniques needed for puppy classes to their Regional Managers for evaluation. Coaching was given as needed and this resulted in much faster learning of all necessary abilities and techniques. It was such a success that we will be continuing it in the future, and we now have a truly amazing and comprehensive training programme for new trainees which comprises:

- A 2-day face-to-face introductory weekend
- 25 hours of live online lessons (evenings) on a vast range of subjects
- Video coaching to learn essential skills and techniques
- A 3-day practical course working hands-on with real puppies and their owners
- A course of home study comprised of practical exercises and observations

This year, 13 people joined us and trained under the new programme, some of whom are ready to begin classes early in the new year.

Challenging times

Where are all the puppies?

This year saw its challenges in terms of puppy numbers coming through our classes. A combination of a difficult economic climate coupled with the 'bust' that followed the pandemic 'boom' of puppies purchased meant that numbers were down across the UK and it was a difficult time for puppy trainers everywhere. Hopefully, numbers will return to normal next year as the economy grows and the puppy purchasing levels return to normal.

Marketing initiative

This year we laid the foundations for a new marketing structure for the future of Puppy School. With good new designers found and used to improve many aspects of our image, from certificates to our logos, with the new website up and running, and a brilliant marketing consultant found and recruited, we are ready to embark on a new marketing programme that will help with the promoting of individual classes as well as raising the profile and awareness of Puppy School amongst puppy owners everywhere. In addition, we have put together an incredibly talented 'Behaviour and Training Project' team to help move along some of the work on new courses and other ventures that will improve what we do. After a quiet year this year, we hope to rise like a phoenix next year and let people know what an incredible organisation we really are.

Key Puppy School Statistics

Total numbers

At the end of 2023, Puppy School now comprises of 70 full tutors and 40 associate tutors teaching Puppy School, Older Puppy School, Puppy University and SuperPup courses. We have 12 resting tutors/associates (those not currently active, either on maternity leave or taking a break). We have 16 provisional tutors and 10 provisional associates currently working on their correspondence course.

New tutors and associates

We had new 7 tutors and 6 new associate tutors train with us during 2023 and we already have keen new applicants waiting to undertake their tutor training course in 2024.

Puppy numbers

Despite the continuous knock-on effect of the pandemic and the problems in the economy brought on by world events, the number of puppies going through our Puppy School classes in 2023 has been surprisingly high overall with nearly 6,000 puppies completing our classes this year. This brings the total number of puppies which have passed through the hands of Puppy School tutors to 106, 124 during the 20 years we have been running. Helping over 100,000 pups and their owners towards more positive training is an amazing achievement that we are all really proud to be part of.

Puppy School tutor training course

Well-developed course

The Puppy School tutor training course has evolved over the years to become more of a training journey that we all take together. We now have many experienced tutors involved in the training and our genuine care about what each trainee experiences and learns is what makes this training amazing.

Thinking back to my own training many years ago, nearly a decade, this course now looks very different. The nerves of trainee tutors and the pressure to want to do well are still the same, however, the hands-on experience and opportunities to learn, refine and develop own techniques, are something I wish I had all those years ago. Having trainees work with their Regional Managers for video coaching of techniques has also helped to forge strong bonds between them (as identified by our RM feedback survey) which is so valuable for cohesive working as the trainee becomes a fully fledged tutor or associate tutor.

When looking at how to earn the Puppy School certificate, daunting is a word often used, when they see all that they have to do. However, on completion, trainees say they feel empowered, that all of the teaching was invaluable and that they feel really ready to start their classes. Each trainee's journey will be unique to them so each one takes something different from it, genuine 'gems of

information' that they can utilise moving forwards. It's lovely to hear them come up with a few additional ones we can use in our own classes. This year's included 'let their nervous system go on holiday' when describing the 'settle' exercise (originally from Catherine Tomlinson and said in pressure of the class situation by associate trainee Liz Villabona) and 'dogs can smell a teaspoon of scent in a swimming pool' to describe the amazing power of a dog's nose (originally from Alexandra Horowitz brought to us when teaching a class by trainee Nicci Brown).

Practise with puppies

A firm favourite with the trainees (and course teachers) are the practical days where we bring in owners and their puppies from local classes and local Facebook ads. This is where trainees can practise and get real hands-on experience. This Autumn, we had over 26 puppies attend the three practical days and what an amazing mixture of breeds, including a rather wonderful Dachshund who came complete with coat and four matching boots to complete his assemble!

Many owners attended more than one session and one very kindly bought chocolate to say thank you. Those who came as a result of the Facebook advert asked about getting in touch with their local Puppy School trainer for further training. The overwhelming comments from owners who attended these sessions



were the professionalism and ability of the trainees. For me, one lovely moment of the practical course was the introduction of 'Boris' (a ferret-shaped dog toy used to simulate a puppy), a small, flat looking puppy who lacked a bit of enthusiasm. However, he made for lots of light relief and reduced us all to laughter.

It's no mean feat to ensure that each training course runs smoothly and there are now many who contribute to its success, including the trainees, teachers (online and face-to-face), Regional Managers, Operations Administration and local tutors who help to source owners and their puppies. All of this combined effort certainly proves that Puppy School really is a family, working together.

Launch of new Puppy School website

New resource for owners

Incorporated into the new website is a passworded section just for owners who book onto our courses. Split into two sections:


- the Good Puppy Pages cover a broad range of useful information to help owners raise their puppy with positivity and;

This year saw the consolidation of the introduction of 'puppy greetings' to the Puppy School syllabus that began in October 2022. We updated the Puppy School Manual in the light of this and added a new design that mirrors that of the new website. 20 years of puppy training

The bad old days

When I got the first puppy I owned as an adult, about 30 years ago, dog training in the UK consisted mostly of fairly forceful people who thought you needed to dominate your dog and keep it in its place if it was to 'obey' you. Training was thought too damaging for very young puppies and so they weren't allowed in training classes until at least 6 months of age.

My experience of taking Winnie, my precious 6 month old Rhodesian Ridgeback puppy, to a local class ended with me walking out early when they told me that the way to get her to lay down on command was to force her head down by standing on the lead close to her collar. I knew there had to be a better way so I took her home to find an alternative way to train.

A need for change

As a young behaviourist working with rescue dogs, I could see there was a really big need to reach puppy owners early on to prevent them wanting to give their dogs up to rescue during adolescence and so, eventually, I started to run positive puppy training classes for owners myself. To research this, I visited a large number of other trainers in the local area and what I saw was very sad for the puppies involved. It did convince me, however, that despite having such a limited knowledge at that time, I could almost certainly do better than that.

At first, since my main motivation was to keep dogs in homes, I was more interested in teaching how to raise a puppy well. However, I quickly realised that owners didn't come to classes to listen to long explanations interspersed by a little bit of training. They wanted action and they came to class to learn skills and techniques that could help with everyday life. So, instead, I wrote what I wanted them to know into a variety of leaflets which later became the basis of The Perfect Puppy book, and I worked on making my classes more active.

Eventually a successful formula evolved that consisted of explaining why they needed to train something, showing them how to do it, encouraging them to practice while coaching them into getting it right, and giving them a good reason to practice this at home. This was so successful that it is still the foundation of how we train in Puppy School today.

Over the years that I ran puppy classes, I was constantly changing and re-evaluating how I did things. I tried longer and shorter courses, changes to what was included, and different ways of running them, until I had a good system. It was then that I decided to start training others to run the classes so I could reach more puppies and Puppy School was born.

The positive revolution

When we started, there were very few positive trainers and it was easy for our new puppy tutors to establish themselves. Gradually over the intervening years though, as behaviour work became more positive and more and more education on how to train in a positive way became available, it has become more difficult to find an area without a good puppy class in it. While making things more difficult for Puppy School, it is great news for puppies.

These days it has become the norm to train puppies early with positive methods. There are still a few people out there teaching with poor technique or outdated methods but good puppy classes are not rare like they used to be. The tide has turned and puppy owners can now easily find a class where their puppy will be kindly treated and they will not be humiliated or ridiculed if they don't get it right first time. It is a truly amazing turn around in just 20 years and I'm very pleased that we have been just a small part of that transformation.



Puppy School changes

Over the years, the syllabus has changed very little, but important improvements have been made and the way we teach has altered significantly.

The importance of playing with your puppy and how to do it well are now emphasised, and play with other puppies has been replaced by a much less stressful (for all) puppy greetings. 'Off' has transformed into 'Gentle' and we've changed the way we teach puppies to greet people.

The mat sniffing exercise is now an essential part of our classes, and holding and lifting pups onto tables has been replaced with a safer and less startling walk onto a platform. Our classes have changed for the better and our clients now get amazing advice, teaching and coaching from our very well-trained tutors.





Puppy Greetings

In October last year (2022) we began changing over from sessions where selected puppies were allowed to play together to a special method of controlled greetings that we found worked much better. This year we completed the change over and now all Puppy School classes run the much better system of puppy greetings instead.

We had been concerned for a long time that allowing puppies to play together in classes was less than ideal. With a maximum of 8 puppies in class, finding compatible puppies was often difficult. Some were too shy, too boisterous, and age/size differences often made it too difficult to run useful sessions. Some tutors didn't have the experience or confidence to run these sessions, and we never felt we could give new trainees enough tuition for them to run these sessions successfully. In addition, puppies playing on slippery floors and in a fairly barren environment for such a short amount of time was not the best way for them to learn to enjoy each other's company.

So we came up with a system of allowing

puppies to greet each other in a controlled way instead. After watching a webinar by Chirag Patel, we thought about how we could slow things down and still give puppies the socialisation with others that they needed. We formed a small task force with experienced tutors Louise Taylor and Claire Luscombe and we gradually evolved the great system we are now using.

Louise Taylor came up with a brilliant way of helping owners understand why the 3 second greeting is so effective, and came up with the system of counting out loud so owners could really get into the habit of fast turning. She also developed the 'turning away' exercise that we teach on week 1 which is so useful for owners to learn.

Puppy School now has a very effective way of helping owners to learn how to introduce their puppy to others without causing harm or concern. It allows them to really socialise their puppy and avoid all the problems that can happen when a puppy is rushed into encounters they are not ready for.

Benefits of the puppy greetings system include:

- Puppies learn to be calm around others rather than becoming aroused and immediately wanting to play
- The system works for shy puppies too and they begin to feel safe when they realise others will turn away from them or they are turned away before they start to get scared
- The system is easy to teach to trainees and they can begin this exercise as soon as they begin classes without doing any harm
- Owners learn to gently turn their puppies rather than pulling them away and we notice them using this technique for other purposes which helps prevent puppy frustration
- Owners learn a great system for introducing their puppies to others outside of class and begin to understand how delicate their puppy's developing psyche is, and how it makes sense to take things slowly

Puppy School Plans for 2024

One of our main goals this year is to work on developing and implementing a central marketing strategy to bring Puppy School to the attention of more puppy owners as well as the veterinary profession and the public in general. In addition, our new Behaviour Projects Team will begin working on the new developments that will take Puppy School into the future. The Puppy School Conference with its amazing line up of speakers will run in June next year and will be open, for the first time, to practitioner members of the Animal Behaviour and Training Council. It is all set to be an incredible get together for the Puppy School family, and we hope to make some interesting new friends along the way.



Getting feedback

Class feedback for every Puppy School class is now collected electronically. The booking system automatically sends out a questionnaire to clients via email at the end of each class and responses are available for both tutors and Regional Manager to see. Not every client responds, but most responses are favourable.

Any less-than-favourable feedback is monitored and learnt from if necessary. Although many tutors worry about getting a negative review, it may simply be more dependent on what is happening in that person's life at the time, rather than a true relection of the classes. It is important to keep these in perspective.

We have had some truly lovely photographs and fantastic positive responses through. People have more time to consider what they will write than at the end of the class when they are getting ready to leave and so tend to write longer and more considered recommendations of tutors and their classes. Each month, the best of the responses and photographs will be added to the Testimonial section of the new website. These will be chosen at random to appear at the bottom of every page of the website, and will build slowly over time, giving an amazing catalogue of positive feedback.
